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Let's Eat Autumn Apple Pork planeatmove.com



Ingredients:

- 2-pound pork loin
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¾ teaspoon dried sage
- 3 apples, cored and sliced
- ¹/₂ cup dried cranberries
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1 tablespoon honey

Directions:

- Season pork on both sides with garlic powder, salt and sage. Wrap pork tightly in foil and place in the slow cooker.
- Place apple slices, cranberries and butter on a large piece of foil. Drizzle with honey. Wrap up foil to create a packet. Place in slow cooker.
- 3. Cook 4 hours on high.
- 4. Unwrap both packets. Slice pork and top with apples. Optional step: brown the top of the pork loin in the oven at 425 degrees for five to seven minutes.

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Do you ask yourself which apples are best for eating, baking or storing? Here's a short listing of apples and their best uses.

Braeburn- tangy-sweet, very firm and hard, also for baked apples

Fuji- sweet, firm flesh

Gala- small, with rich sweet flavor, very juicy, dries well

Golden Delicious- crisp, juicy flesh, especially good for pies or baking whole; some say best flavor develops in cooking

Granny Smith- very late ripening, hard, firm, tart; develops mellow flavor when fully ripe after storage



Jonagold- very good balanced sweet-tart flavor, large fruit, holds up well in baking whole

Jonathan- bestseller in early 1900s; small, slightly tart

McIntosh- important commercial apple in eastern U.S.; highly aromatic, spicy, does not keep well

Red Delicious- popular commercial market apple, can reach very good quality if properly harvested & stored



Dollars & Sense
