Arts Can Enhance Student Accomplishments

Through 4-H we strive to help youth develop into well-rounded individuals. One of the ways we do that is through arts education and expression. 4-H'ers have numerous opportunities to express their creativity through programs covering many diverse art forms.

Not only do the arts help mold well-rounded young adults, but studies show arts education can lead to higher overall academic achievement. Research has shown young people who participate in some form of musical education have enhanced spatial skills, which are critical skills in many science, engineering, technology, and math-related careers. Young people who study music also tend to have higher math scores.

Studies show students who participate in drama tend to have a broader range of verbal skills. Enhanced verbal skills help young people increase their reading comprehension, overall reading achievement, reading readiness and writing.

Drawing and painting can also lead to improved verbal skills. Research conducted in New Hampshire beginning in the mid-1990s shows that when students are allowed to draw a story before they write it, they are better able to fully develop and describe their story when they write it. As a result, students who engage in this form of learning have significant improvements in writing and visual literacy. In the research study, this improvement was across the board for students, including those participating in Title I and special education, students for whom English is their second language and boys, who tend to trail girls nationally in this area.

This recipe could be used with your favorite pot of chili or soup when weather gets colder. It's also a recipe you can enter into the fair. Enjoy!

RECIPE: Cornmeal Muffins



Recipe adapted for use by Kentucky 4-H from **Southern Style Cornbread** published by Martha White Foods

Yield: 12 Muffins

Ingredients

- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 1/3 cups milk or 1 3/4 cups buttermilk
- 1/4 cup oil or melted shortening
- 2 cups self-rising cornmeal mix*

Equipment

- 12-cup muffin pan
- Cooking spray
- Small bowl
- Large mixing bowl
- Measuring cups
- Spoon for mixing



Order of Work

1. Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Spray a 12-cup muffin tin with non-stick spray.
2. In a small bowl, beat the egg slightly.
3. Measure the remaining ingredients and pour them into a large mixing bowl.
4. Add the beaten egg to the large bowl.
5. Mix just enough to blend the ingredients but is still lumpy. (If the batter is smooth, it has probably been mixed too much.)
6. Fill the sprayed muffin cups two-thirds full of batter. Do not use paper or foil liners.
7. Bake at 450 degrees F for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

Baking Tip: *Be sure to read the package to make sure that you are using *self-rising cornmeal mix*. It is usually packaged in a bag that is similar to that in which flour is sold.

Self-rising cornmeal mix has flour and leavening already added. (Boxed corn muffin mix like that made by Jiffy is not the appropriate product to use in this recipe.)

Nutrition Facts per Muffin: 240 calories, 10 g fat, 640 mg sodium, 33 g carbohydrate, 3 g fiber, 5 g protein, 30 mg cholesterol



For the fair:

- This recipe is based on use of a standard size muffin pan. If using a mini size tin, reduce cooking time to 8 to 10 minutes or until golden brown.
- After the muffins cool, place them on a disposable plate.
- Place the plate in a re-closeable zip-type plastic bag.
